Welcome


On behalf of everyone at St. John's, Toorak, a very warm welcome to this church and faith community. St. John's welcomes everyone to all services and events, regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, race or background.

This is a wonderful and historic church, founded in 1859, and celebrating our 160th year! We are part of the Anglican Church of Australia and a member of the global Anglican Communion, comprised of 80 million people.

Regular services of worship are held each Sunday at 8am and 10am, Wednesday at 7pm, and Thursday at 12.15pm. All are welcome. Services are followed by times of fellowship over food and drinks to which everyone is also welcome.

This church actively follows Jesus' command to love God, love one's neighbour and to care for all people. Our clergy and parishioners regularly visit the sick, home-bound, and the dying. We care for the poor and needy through service and charitable giving, through our Opportunity Shop run in partnership with the local Catholic and Uniting churches, and by supporting the work of Anglicare, The Brotherhood of St. Laurence and The Anglican Board of Mission. Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry. If we can be of service to you or your family, please do not hesitate to get in touch. If you would like to give of your time and talents in the service of others, please also contact the church and we will gladly welcome your contribution.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

The Old Testament Lesson Genesis 15.1-12, 17-18

Read at 8am by Carmen Papageorge and 10am by a volunteer reader ¹After these things the word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, 'Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.' ²But Abram said, 'O Lord God , what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?' ³And Abram said, 'You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.' ⁴But the word of the Lord came to him, 'This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.' ⁵He brought him outside and said, 'Look towards heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your descendants be.' 6And he believed the Lord ; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness. ⁷Then he said to him, 'I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess.' ⁸But he said, 'O Lord God, how am I to know that I shall possess it?' ⁹He said to him, 'Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtle-dove, and a young pigeon.' ¹⁰He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. ¹¹And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away. ¹²As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him. ¹⁷When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire-pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. ¹⁸On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, 'To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates.

3 ¹⁷Brothers and sisters, join in imitating me, and observe those who live according to the example you have in us. ¹⁸For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; I have often told you of them, and now I tell you even with tears. ¹⁹Their end is destruction; their god is the belly; and their glory is in their shame; their minds are set on earthly things. ²⁰But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a

Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ. ²¹He will transform the body of our humiliation so that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself. 4 ¹Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved. Hear the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

The Gospel Luke 13.1-9

The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, Chapter 13, commencing at verse one. **Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.**

¹At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. ²He asked them, 'Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? ³No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. ⁴Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them – do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? ⁵No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did.' ⁶Then he told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. ⁷So he said to the gardener, "See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?" ⁸He replied, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig round it and put manure on it. ⁹If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down." Music Notes

[Anthem]. Purcell composed a setting of the sixth of the seven sentences of the Anglican Burial Service for the occasion of the funeral of Queen Mary II. Its severe text is perhaps not unsuitable to the greater self-examining of Lent. The text is from the Book of Common Prayer (1662): *Ave verum corpus natum* is a short Eucharistic hymn dating from the 14th century and attributed to Pope Innocent VI (d 1362).

Organ Repairs Update

The new capture system [which controls key to pipe contact and how stops are controlled] has been installed and is in the stage of de-bugging any issues which may arise between the setup and the software.

The leather work on the bellows and wind-trunks has resulted in a much superior supply of wind and complements repairs on the Swell Organ tremulant and concussion bellows; [taken last August for repairs].

Thank you to all for your continued interest in and support of the organ repairs. I am happy to answer questions about this work, and to give tours inside the instrument which provide a better understanding of what goes on behind the façade.

Ecumenical Candle

In front of the pulpit the Ecumenical Candle is lit, representing the unity of the Toorak Ecumenical Movement, comprised of the Toorak Uniting Church, The Swedish Church, St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church and our own St. John's. Each of the churches in the Movement keeps the candle for one month before passing it on to the next member church.

Guest Preacher Today

Debra Saffrey-Collins is our guest preacher at 8am and 10am services today. Debra is General Manager of Chaplaincy and Diocesan Partnerships for The Brotherhood of St. Laurence. This Anglican agency was founded by Fr Gerard Tucker in 1930 and works to tackle poverty through grassroots programs and policy development informed by research. St. John's has been a strong supporter of BSL, a particularly memorable example was the sale of beach towels which raised \$2,000 for the Breakfast Club in Fitzroy that ensures kids have a nutritious meal before the school day.

Anglican Board of Mission/Aprons

The Annual Anglican Board of Mission Lenten appeal is fast approaching presenting an ideal time to purchase for \$25 one of our special St. John's aprons, all profits go to the Mission, approx. \$600 to date, with your help, it would be great to increase this to \$1,000.
