On behalf of everyone at St. John's, Toorak, a very warm welcome to this church and faith community. St. John's welcomes everyone to all services and events, regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, race or background.

This is a wonderful and historic church, founded in 1859, and celebrating our 160th year! We are part of the Anglican Church of Australia and a member of the global Anglican Communion, comprised of 80 million people.

Regular services of worship are held each Sunday at 8am and 10am, Wednesday at 7pm, and Thursday at 12.15pm. All are welcome. Services are followed by times of fellowship over food and drinks to which everyone is also welcome.

This church actively follows Jesus' command to love God, love one's neighbour and to care for all people. Our clergy and parishioners regularly visit the sick, home-bound, and the dying. We care for the poor and needy through service and charitable giving, through our Opportunity Shop run in partnership with the local Catholic and Uniting churches, and by supporting the work of Anglicare, The Brotherhood of St. Laurence and The Anglican Board of Mission. Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry. If you would like to give of your time and talents in the service of others, please also contact the church and we will gladly welcome your contribution.

21¹⁰And in the spirit he carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God. ¹¹It has the glory of God and a radiance like a very rare jewel, like jasper, clear as crystal. ¹²It has a great, high wall with twelve gates, and at the gates twelve angels, and on the gates are inscribed the names of the twelve tribes of the Israelites; ¹³on the east three gates, on the north three gates, on the south three gates, and on the west three gates. ¹⁴And the wall of the city has twelve foundations, and on them are the twelve names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb. 22 ¹Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb ²through the middle of the street of the city. Welcome To The Revd Dr Robert (Bob) Derrenbacker

The Dean of Trinity Theological School, Bob has had a distinguished career before joining Trinity in January of this year. Robert has been President of Thorneloe University, an Anglican college federated with Laurentian University in Sudbury, Ontario, Canada, since 2009. He holds degrees in Theology from the University of St. Michael's College at the University of Toronto (PhD), Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary (MATS) and Wheaton College (BA). Prior to joining Thorneloe University, Robert was Associate Professor of New Testament at Regent College in Vancouver, British Columbia. From 2000 to 2003, he was Associate Dean and Assistant Professor of New Testament at Tyndale Seminary in Toronto and in 2005 he was a Visiting Fellow in the Faculty of Theology at the Katholieke Universiteit, Leuven, Belgium. He has also taught at St. Peter's Theological Seminary, London, Ontario, and St. Michael's College and Wycliffe College at the University of Toronto. HIs areas of expertise lie in the New Testament, especially the gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Amongst other engagements, Bob is currently the President, Board of Trustees, Colleges and Universities of the Anglican Communion, 2014 to present (Trustee since 2011).

Parish Stewardship 2018 - 2019: Update

We are now mid-way through our Stewardship for the period of 2018 - 2019, which is an opportune time to review where we stand in relation to our stewardship of the parish. Interestingly, our current parish recorder, Helen Ballantyne, who has held this position since October 2014, has informed me that in her time of recording this is **our best year to date** with anticipated pledges for the year 2018 -2019 on track to be close to \$150,000. When we consider for the year 2014 – 2015 this was in the vicinity of \$100,000, and pledge income for the years 2014, 15, 16 and 17 was also received from All Saints Kooyong, this is a most pleasing result. Many thanks to all of you who contribute to our church in this fashion.

Nevertheless we cannot afford to be complacent! To give you a few facts:

- Our annual stipend and salary expenditure for Peter, Elizabeth, Sally and Chris is a modest \$300,000.

- The estimated maintenance and cleaning costs alone for our properties is \$55,000.

- We thus have to rely on investments and rental incomes to make up the rest of our \$550,000 annual budget.

- We have approximately 180 households on our parish roll of which 66 (a third) are pledging - imagine how much better off we could be if more parishioners were committed to pledging? If you do not do so already, please give this your prayerful consideration.

I remain very positive about our future as we are blessed with parishioners who support, volunteer and are committed to the spiritual, financial and fellowship growth of St John's.

2019 Diocesan Synod - call for Lay Representatives ***IMPORTANT***

In the Anglican Church, a diocese is governed by a synod (pr. [sin-*uh* d]), that is, a bishop acting with the advice and consent of representatives of the clergy and laity of the diocese. The presiding bishop (in the case of the Diocese of Melbourne, the Archbishop) calls the synod to meet, usually annually, to discuss, debate and decide on various matters of business such as the Diocesan budget, legislation for consideration by the General Synod of the Anglican Church of Australia, and other issues that concern the church. The synod also elects people to various committees and boards in the Diocese, as well as choosing General Synod representatives. The synod is divided into the House of Clergy, and the House of Laity. All clergy licensed to the Diocese of Melbourne are automatically members of the synod. Parishes elect lay synod representatives from their congregation. The number of representatives from each parish depends on the structure and size of the parish.

This year Synod meets at St. Paul's Cathedral from Wednesday 16 October (7-10pm), Thursday 17 October (7-10pm), Friday 18 October (7-10pm) and Saturday 19 October (10am-5pm (although often finishes earlier)). Synod commences with a grand and moving service in the Cathedral on the Wednesday evening and a presidential Address by the Archbishop and Primate. Each evening is marked by interesting and often vigorous debate and speakers and often major decisions about the life of the church are made. It is possible depending upon the agenda to attend some and not all of the proceedings.

This is a major and important event in the life of our Diocese <u>and it is extremely</u> <u>important</u> that we have a full component of lay representatives from St. John's. We are entitled to elect 3 lay representatives and 1 alternate lay representative (in the case that one of the former 3 is unavoidably unavailable). Please contact the Vicar (<u>vicar@saintjohnstoorak.org</u>) to express your interest in such a position. In case of there being more people interested than positions available, then an election will be held on Sunday 16 June immediately following the 10am service.
