

On behalf of everyone at St. John's, Toorak, a very warm welcome to this church and faith community. St. John's welcomes everyone to all services and events, regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, race or background.

This is a wonderful and historic church, founded in 1859, and celebrating our 160th year! We are part of the Anglican Church of Australia and a member of the global Anglican Communion, comprised of 80 million people.

Regular services of worship are held each Sunday at 8am and 10am, Wednesday at 7pm, and Thursday at 12.15pm. All are welcome. Services are followed by times of fellowship over food and drinks to which everyone is also welcome.

This church actively follows Jesus' command to love God, love one's neighbour and to care for all people. Our clergy and parishioners regularly visit the sick, home-bound, and the dying. We care for the poor and needy through service and charitable giving, through our Opportunity Shop run in partnership with the local Catholic and Uniting churches, and by supporting the work of Anglicare, The Brotherhood of St. Laurence and The Anglican Board of Mission. Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry. <sup>1</sup>Ahab told Jezebel all that Elijah had done, and how he had killed all the prophets with the sword. <sup>2</sup>Then Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah, saving

prophets with the sword. <sup>2</sup>Then Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah, saying, 'So may the gods do to me, and more also, if I do not make your life like the life of one of them by this time tomorrow.' 3Then he was afraid; he got up and fled for his life, and came to Beer-sheba, which belongs to Judah; he left his servant there. <sup>4</sup>But he himself went a day's journey into the wilderness, and came and sat down under a solitary broom tree. #### The Second Lesson Galatians 3.10-14, 23-29

Read at 8am by Lindsay Hosking, and at 10am by Claire Beecher

<sup>10</sup>For all who rely on the works of the law are under a curse; for it is written, 'Cursed is everyone who does not observe and obey all the things written in the book of the law.' 11 Now it is evident that no one is justified before God by the law; for 'The one who is righteous will live by faith.' <sup>12</sup>But the law does not rest on faith; on the contrary, 'Whoever does the works of the law will live by them.' 13Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us—for it is written, 'Cursed is everyone who hangs on a tree' - 14in order that in Christ Jesus the blessing of Abraham might come to the Gentiles, so that we might receive the promise of the Spirit through faith. <sup>23</sup>Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. <sup>24</sup>Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith. <sup>25</sup>But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian, <sup>26</sup> for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. <sup>27</sup>As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. <sup>28</sup>There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. <sup>29</sup>And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise.

## The Gospel Luke 8.26-39

The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, Chapter 8, commencing at verse twenty six. Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

<sup>26</sup>Then they arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. <sup>27</sup>As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons

met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. <sup>28</sup>When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, 'What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me' — <sup>29</sup> for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) 30 Jesus then asked him, 'What is your name?' He said, 'Legion'; for many demons had entered him. 31 They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss. 32 Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. 33Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned. 34When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. 35 Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. 36Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. <sup>37</sup>Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. 38 The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, <sup>39</sup> Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you.' So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

#### **Music Notes**

*Rejoice in the Lord alway* is a fine example of a verse anthem: one in which soloists alternate with the full resources of the group. Known from early years as the Bell Anthem due to the effect of the opening orchestral ritornello, Z49 dates from 1682-5, a period in which Purcell composed a prolific quantity of anthems utilising strings.

#### O salutaris hostia

Elgar composed no fewer than six settings of this devotional Eucharistic text, including fragments now lost. No 3 in F major dates from the 1880s. We will also be performing No 1 in E-flat in the second half of the year.

An **Organ Plus** Series of concerts is to be held in the Parish Church on the Fifth Sundays from 12pm to 1pm, with refreshments to conclude. This is a wonderful opportunity to showcase one of the finest parish organs in the country, and our lively parish community. The programs are carefully designed to highlight the associated artist, the parish organ in solo and accompaniment roles, as well as a wide variety of styles and repertoire. #### Prevention of Violence Against Women Program at St. John's

The Diocese of Melbourne's Preventing Violence Against Women Program (of which our Vicar is a Taskforce member) launches its training program in this month, offering training days across the Diocese for active clergy and key lay leaders in parishes.

Violence against women is a serious and widespread issue in Australia. With the right knowledge and skills, church leaders can play an important and influential role in preventing violence against women and supporting people who experience family violence. Such training is critical in making our churches safer spaces. The hope is that St. John's will send not only our active clergy but will also nominate a female lay leader to attend the training and then take on the role of Family Safety Officer in the church, being a point of contact for anyone in the church to seek further information.
