On behalf of everyone at St. John's, Toorak, a very warm welcome to this church and faith community. St. John's welcomes everyone to all services and events, regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, race or background.

This is a wonderful and historic church, founded in 1859, and celebrating our 160th year! We are part of the Anglican Church of Australia and a member of the global Anglican Communion, comprised of 80 million people.

Regular services of worship are held each Sunday at 8am and 10am, and Wednesday at 7pm. All are welcome. Services are followed by times of fellowship over food and drinks to which everyone is also welcome.

This church actively follows Jesus' command to love God, love one's neighbour and to care for all people. Our clergy and parishioners regularly visit the sick, home-bound, and the dying. We care for the poor and needy through service and charitable giving, through our Opportunity Shop run in partnership with the local Catholic and Uniting churches, and by supporting the work of Anglicare, The Brotherhood of St. Laurence and The Anglican Board of Mission. Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry. If you would like to give of your time and talents in the service of others, please also contact the church and we will gladly welcome your contribution.

¹The word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord: ² Come, go down to the potter's house, and there I will let you hear my words.' 3So I went down to the potter's house, and there he was working at his wheel. ⁴The vessel he was making of clay was spoiled in the potter's hand, and he reworked it into another vessel, as seemed good to him. ⁵Then the word of the Lord came to me: 6Can I not do with you, O house of Israel, just as this potter has done? says the Lord . ¹Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus, and Timothy our brother, To Philemon our dear friend and co-worker, ²to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our fellow-soldier, and to the church in your house: ³Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. ⁴When I remember you in my prayers, I always thank my God ⁵ because I hear of your love for all the saints and your faith towards the Lord Jesus. 6I pray that the sharing of your faith may become effective when you perceive all the good that we may do for Christ. 7I have indeed received much joy and encouragement from your love, because the hearts of the saints have been refreshed through you, my brother. 8For this reason, though I am bold enough in Christ to command you to do your duty, 9yet I would rather appeal to you on the basis of love - and I, Paul, do this as an old man, and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus. 10I am appealing to you for my child, Onesimus, whose father I have become during my imprisonment. ¹¹Formerly he was useless to you, but now he is indeed useful both to you and to me. ¹²I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. ¹³I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might be of service to me in your place during my imprisonment for the gospel; 14but I preferred to do nothing without your consent, in order that your good deed might be voluntary and not something forced. ¹⁵Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while, so that you might have him back for ever, ¹⁶no longer as a slave but as more than a slave, a beloved brother especially to me but how much more to you, both in the flesh and in the Lord. ¹⁷So if you consider me your partner, welcome him as you would welcome me. 18 If he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. 19I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I say nothing about your owing me even your own self. ²⁰Yes, brother, let me have this benefit from you in the Lord! Refresh my heart in Christ. ²¹Confident of your obedience, I am writing to you, knowing that you will do even more than I say. 22 One thing more - prepare a guest room for me, for I am hoping through your prayers to be restored to you. ²³Epaphras, my fellow-prisoner in Christ Jesus, sends greetings to you, 24 and so do Mark, Aristarchus, Demas, and Luke, my fellow-workers. ²⁵ The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit.

September is Stewardship Month at St. John's

Today marks the beginning of our Parish Stewardship month, in which we make our pledges of financial support for our wonderful church. We do this each September so the clergy, Wardens and Parish Council can, with the Treasurer, prepare the church budget for the coming year, which is passed at our Annual Meeting, held this year on November 17, at 11.30am.

Our budget funds everything we do as a church: our worship, our care of the sick and the poor, the upkeep of this marvellous church, the hall and vicarage, the payment of our priests Peter and Elizabeth and our staff Sally and Christopher, and our provision of education and social events, alongside our commitment to the community. *Absolutely essential* to the creation of the budget, and the ability to pay for these things, is knowing how much financial support the church can expect in the coming year.

And key to that is **pledging**, that is, how much money each of us pledge to give the church over the course of the year. So this September, please do commit to pledging to St. John's by completing a pledge form (found in the foyer) and help the church continue its ministry and mission. The more you pledge, the more we can do!

Please also consider giving on a regular basis using the Anglican Development Fund, details of which can be found in the foyer. 90% of parishioners use this method and all those using it are most comfortable with its convenience. Persons counting the collection have commented how much easier and safer it is not to have to open and count dozens of envelopes each Sunday too! Did you know that St. John's does not receive any income from the government or community groups? We are entirely 'self-funded' and rely entirely upon two sources of income: the generosity of our past and present parishioners through bequests and pledging respectively; and, income from the provision of pastoral services and use of our hall.

People also often think that the Diocese of Melbourne supports us by paying for the clergy, providing money for the upkeep of the church or paying for everything! In fact the opposite is true: St. John's, like every viable parish church in the Diocese of

Melbourne, supports the wider diocese of which we are a part by contributing to the cost of running the diocese through what is called 'annual assessment.' Last year our assessment was \$70,000 which we contributed for the good of the overall mission and ministry of the Diocese of Melbourne.
