# Welcome


On behalf of everyone at St. John's, Toorak, a very warm welcome to this church and faith community. St. John's welcomes everyone to all services and events, regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, race or background.

This is a wonderful and historic church, founded in 1859, and celebrating our 160th anniversary this year! We are part of the Anglican Church of Australia and a member of the global Anglican Communion, comprised of 80 million people.

Regular services of worship are held each Sunday at 8am and 10am, and Wednesday at 7pm. All are welcome. Services are followed by times of fellowship over food and drinks to which everyone is also welcome.

This church actively follows Jesus' command to love God, love one's neighbour and to care for all people. Our clergy and parishioners regularly visit the sick, home-bound, and the dying. We care for the poor and needy through service and charitable giving, through our Opportunity Shop run in partnership with the local Catholic and Uniting churches, and by supporting the work of Anglicare, The Brotherhood of St. Laurence and The Anglican Board of Mission. Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry. If we can be of service to you or your family, please do not hesitate to get in touch. If you would like to give of your time and talents in the service of others, please also contact the church and we will gladly welcome your contribution.

# The Gospel Luke 18.1-14

The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, Chapter 18, commencing at verse one. **Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.** 

<sup>1</sup>Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. <sup>2</sup>He said, 'In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. <sup>3</sup>In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, "Grant me justice against my opponent." <sup>4</sup>For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, "Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, <sup>5</sup>yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming." '6And the Lord said, 'Listen to what the unjust judge says. <sup>7</sup>And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? 8I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?' 9He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: 10'Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax-collector. 11The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, "God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax-collector. 12I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income." 13But the tax-collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" <sup>14</sup>I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted.' #### **Guest Preacher This Week**

It is our pleasure to welcome to St. John's Bron Davis-Jones, Volunteer Supervisor for The Richmond Churches Food Centre. She will be speaking at both services about her work and the support they provide for the vulnerable in our community. The Food Centre is supported by our Op Shop and Trivia Night, as well as by the annual Food for Friends campaign.

The Richmond Churches Food Centre is supported by 5 of the local Richmond Churches, including Catholic, Uniting and Anglican parishes. With a wonderful crew of volunteers they provide food parcels to approximately 400 people per week. They receive food donations from Foodbank, Fare Share and Second Bite plus other generous groups who support them. Bron's responsibilities are vast, including ordering, rostering of volunteers plus the day to day running of the Centre when they give out parcels. She has an extensive background working with disadvantaged people, in remote indigenous communities and specific case work in the Hunter Valley in NSW with people with mental health and addiction issues. This has given her a broad background of experience to be able to support the diverse client base and volunteers. Her organisational and administrative skills come from an early

adventure as an Officer in the RAAF, so they run a good but tight ship at the Food Centre! Bron says, "At the Food Centre we provide meaningful conversation and Food Parcels and I am very proud of how we manage this vital work."
