Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry. Mask Wearing at St. John's no longer mandatory - but recommended!

Further to the government's further easing of Covid restrictions and the consequent advice from the Archbishop's Office, mask wearing during church services is no longer mandatory. Given the continued pandemic, the rising number of cases (including those at St. John's) and the continuing need to look after each other - especially those who are most vulnerable to infection - I recommend that we do continue to wear masks, especially when we are unable to physically distance ourselves from one another. *The Vicar*.

Distribution of Wine at all Services of Communion

On St. John's Day, May 8, we returned to the sharing of consecrated wine at all our services of Communion. It has now been two years since we have been able to receive the consecrated wine at Communion and I trust this is a welcome return to a central expression of our communion with Christ. We have received advice from the Archbishop's Office to say that this is now a possibility, given the health advice shared with the Diocese by the Health Department. As is our custom, on Sundays two chalices of consecrated wine are available: the first can be sipped from; the second, wafers can be partially dipped into. With the shared chalice, please know this is very hygienic: all our chalices are made of pure metal (and thus do not absorb anything), the wine (a port, which is fortified wine) has an alcohol content of 22% which kills germs and the chalice is wiped with a clean, linen cloth, and rotated, after each person has drunk from it. With the chalice for intinction, this also is hygienic, as long as people do not dip their fingers into the wine itself. For those of you concerned more broadly about the hygienic nature of wine at communion, please know that at each service of Communion one of the clergy consumes all of the remaining consecrated wine, as it should not be kept. If this was not hygienic, your

clergy would be sick all the time, which we are not! In fact, clergy are some of the longest living members of the community (in England at least, where this practice is common)! Naturally if you do not wish to receive the wine at Communion, you may simply leave after receiving the bread.

An Update on Parish Council

St. John's is faithfully served by Wardens and Parish Council. The Wardens have special responsibility for the care and upkeep of the church. Two Wardens are elected at the Annual Meeting ('People's Wardens') and the third nominated by the incumbent, that is, the Vicar ('Vicar's Wardens'). Unfortunately, due to ill health, Stella Jongebreuer has had to stand down as Warden. We thank her for her service since the Annual Meeting in November, 2021, and continue to pray for her recovery. Amongst the Parish Council, one person serves as the Treasurer, and we have been faithfully served by Jessica Hall in this capacity for the past almost three years. Again unfortunately, Jess has had to stand down from this position. Jess has made a wonderful contribution to the life of the church and the management and oversight of our finances and we give thanks for her and her contribution. Naturally these positions are being considered by the Parish Council, especially with a view to the Annual Meeting in November. Keith Beecher has kindly stepped in as Treasurer and we are grateful to him for his time and experience with this position. *The Vicar*.
