On behalf of everyone at St. John's, Toorak, a very warm welcome to this church and faith community. St. John's welcomes everyone to all services and events, regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, race or background. This is a wonderful and historic church, founded in 1859. We are part of the Anglican Church of Australia and a member of the global Anglican Communion, comprised of 80 million people.

Regular services of worship are held each Sunday at 8am and 10am, and Wednesday at 7pm. All are welcome. Services are followed by times of fellowship over food and drinks to which everyone is also welcome.

Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry. ¹Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. ²Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. ³By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible. ⁸By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. ⁹By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. ¹⁰For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. ¹¹By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old – and Sarah herself was barren – because he considered him faithful who had promised. ¹²Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, 'as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.' ¹³All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, ¹⁴for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. ¹⁵If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. ¹⁶But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them. Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Music Notes

As the new financial year commences, I wished to include a thank-you note to parishioners for their support: moral, verbal and financial, during this more tricky period of liturgical celebration, and thus the music entailed.

This Sunday sees a number of regular choristers on other duties, giving us the opportunity to sing some of the wonderful writing for alto, tenor and bass. This music is under-explored in the parish setting, and today the personnel for it are ideal.

Another Melbourne parish choir recently sang Byrd's Mass for Three Voices, and horrified parishioners asked if the other choir members all had COVID. They didn't, and it was a decision based on musical and vocal developmental considerations. For us that not unreasonable "conclusion" is only slightly different.

The reality is that many people are affected by COVID, short and long term. We have a core member with residual effects of COVID, gradually improving but not able to dependably sing, yet. Two others are recovered but not yet entirely in optimal singing order.

This weekend we participated in the joy of Finn Gilheany and Alicia Groves' Wedding. We congratulate them and wish them a wonderful honeymoon over the next fortnight, and a long married life.

Members who participate in other choirs, and who have interstate family and business arrangements are wonderful, but similarly make planning less standardised. This situation is the same for 99% of choirs, and one of the tasks of the next few years is to make this element less of an impediment to long-term planning.

While it is not simply a matter of funding, the healthy finances emerging from the Gibb Fund make this task more straightforward. I close this brief thank-you with a reprise of the sentiments at the beginning.
