# Welcome

### Worship

Regular services of worship are held each Sunday at 8am and 10am, and Wednesday at 7pm. Services are followed by times of fellowship over food and drinks. All are welcome.

Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry.

There is one Body and one Spirit; there is one hope in God's call to us.

Baptism is the gift of our Lord Jesus Christ. When he had risen from the dead, he commanded his followers to go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. We have come together to obey that command. Baptism with water signifies the cleansing from sin that Jesus' death makes possible, and the new life that God gives us through the Holy Spirit. In baptism, the promises of God are visibly signed and sealed for us. We are joined to Christ, and made members of his body, the Church universal.

In confirmation those who have been previously baptised come to confirm their baptismal promises and join with the other candidates to receive the laying on of the bishop's hand with prayer. We pray that those who are baptised and confirmed will be empowered by the Holy Spirit for the ministry and service to which God shall call them.

Christians who have been fully initiated in another tradition may be admitted to communicant membership of the Anglican Church through the rite of reception.

So we welcome you, Elise, Scarlett, Joel and John, with your sponsors and families. We give thanks for you, and pray that you may know God's love and faithfulness for ever.

Let us affirm our trust in God's mercy, and confess that we need forgiveness.

### A pause for reflection

Lord God, you created this world, and made us in your own image. Forgive us when we turn away from you. Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy.

Lord God, through your Son you overcame evil and death. Rescue us from slavery to sin.

# THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE FIRST READING Jeremiah 31.27-34 read by Scott Walker

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will sow the house of Israel and the house of Judah with the seed of humans and the seed of animals. And just as I have watched over them to pluck up and break down, to overthrow, destroy, and bring evil, so I will watch over them to build and to plant, says the Lord. In those days they shall no longer say: 'The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge.' But all shall die for their own sins; the teeth of everyone who eats sour grapes shall be set on edge. The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt – a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the Lord', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.


THE SECOND READING 2 Timothy 3.14-4.5 read by Anthony Mannering

But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work. 1 In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

THE GOSPEL Luke 18.1-8

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to St Luke. Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

### THE PRESENTATION

All candidates are invited to come forward, with their sponsors

The priest makes the following invitation

We welcome Elise who comes to be baptised. I invite her sponsor to present her now.

Elise's sponsor says

I present Elise Robin Kennett to be baptised

The bishop makes the following invitation

We welcome Joel and Scarlett who have come to be confirmed. I invite their sponsors to present them now.

Each sponsor in turn says

I present Name to be confirmed

The bishop makes the following invitation

We welcome John who comes to be received into communicant membership of the Anglican Church. I invite his sponsor to present him now.

The sponsor says

I present John Patrick Foley to be received into membership of the Anglican Church

### THE DECISION

The priest says to the candidates to be baptised and confirmed

Before God and this congregation, you must affirm that you turn to Christ and reject all that is evil:

Do you turn to Christ? I turn to Christ.

Do you repent of your sins? I repent of my sins.

Do you reject selfish living, and all that is false and unjust? I reject them all.

Do you renounce Satan and all evil? I renounce all that is evil.

Almighty God, deliver you from the powers of darkness, and lead you in the light of Christ to his everlasting kingdom. **Amen.** 

The priest says to the candidates and sponsors

Will you each, by God's grace, strive to live as a disciple of Christ, loving God with your whole heart, and your neighbour as yourself, until your life's end? I will, with God's help.

The priest says to the congregation

You have heard these our sisters and brothers respond to Christ. Will you support them in this calling? **We will.** 

The priest leads the prayers

Let us pray.

Grant, merciful God, that these persons may be so buried with Christ in baptism that the new nature may be raised up in them. May the fruit of your Spirit grow and flourish in them. **Amen.** 

Give to their sponsors and their families the desire to share with them what you have revealed in your holy gospel. **Amen.** 

May they know Christ's forgiving love and continue in the fellowship and service of his Church. May they proclaim, by word and example, the good news of God in Christ. **Amen.** 

We thank you for the ministry we have in your world and to each other in the household of faith. Hasten that day when the whole creation shall be made perfect in Christ. **Amen.** 

The priest says to the congregation

The Lord be with you. **And also with you.** 

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. **It is right to give our thanks and praise.** 

We give you thanks that at the beginning of creation your Holy Spirit moved upon the waters to bring forth light and life. With water you cleanse and replenish the earth; you nourish and sustain all living things. **Thanks be to God.** 

We give you thanks that through the waters of the Red Sea you led your people out of slavery into freedom, and brought them through the river Jordan to new life in the land of promise. **Thanks be to God.** 

We give you thanks for your Son Jesus Christ: for his baptism by John, for his anointing with the Holy Spirit. **Thanks be to God.** 

We give you thanks that through the deep waters of death Jesus delivered us from our sins and was raised to new life in triumph. **Thanks be to God.** 

We give you thanks for the grace of the Holy Spirit who forms us in the likeness of Christ and leads us to proclaim your kingdom.

Thanks be to God.

And now we give you thanks that you have called this your servant to new birth in your Church through the waters of baptism. Pour out your Holy Spirit in blessing and sanctify this water so that she who is baptised in it may be made one with Christ in his death and resurrection. May she die to sin, rise to newness of life, and continue for ever in Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we give you praise and honour in the unity of the Spirit, now and for ever. **Amen.** 

The priest then says to all the candidates

I now ask you to affirm as yours the faith of the Church.

Do you believe in God the Father?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in God the Son? I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The priest says to the whole congregation

This is the faith of the Church.

This is our faith: We believe in one God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

### THE BAPTISM

Elise is brought to the water

Elise Robin Kennett, I baptise you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

And Elise answers with their sponsors and the congregation

### Amen.

With Holy Chrism, the priest makes a cross on the forehead of Elise, saying

Elise, I sign you with the sign of the cross to show that you are marked as Christ's own for ever.

The priest addresses the Elise

The world now is too dangerous and too beautiful for anything but love. I anoint your eyes so you see God in everyone, your ears so you hear the cry of the poor, your hands so everything you touch is a sacrament, your feet so you run to those who need you. And may your heart be so opened, so set on fire, that your life and your love, changes everything.

Live as a disciple of Christ: fight the good fight, finish the race, keep the faith. Confess Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, look for his coming in glory.

Elise is given a baptismal candle with these words

God has brought you out of darkness into God's marvellous light. Shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father.

God has called you into God's Church. We therefore receive and welcome you as a member with us of the body of Christ, as a child of the one heavenly Father, and as an inheritor of the kingdom of God.

### THE CONFIRMATION

*The bishop says* 

Our help is in the name of the Lord who made heaven and earth.

Blessed be the name of the Lord now, and for ever. Amen.

Almighty and everliving God, you have given your servants new birth by water and the Spirit, and have forgiven them their sins. Strengthen them, we pray, with the Holy Spirit, that they may grow in grace. Increase in them the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of discernment and inner strength, the spirit of knowledge and true godliness, and fill them with wonder and awe at your presence, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.** 

Those who are to be confirmed kneel in turn before the bishop, who lays a hand upon each of them, saying

Strengthen, Lord, your servant, *Name* with your Holy Spirit. Empower and sustain *her/him* for your service. **Amen.** 

When all the candidates have received the laying on of hands, all pray

Defend, O Lord, these your servants with your heavenly grace, that they may continue yours for ever, and daily increase in your Holy Spirit more and more until they come to your everlasting kingdom. Amen.

The Bishop prays

Almighty and everliving God, watch over these your servants upon whom we have now laid our hands. Let your Holy Spirit always be with them and lead them to know and obey your word, that they may serve you in this life, and dwell with you in the life to come: through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.** 

### THE RECEPTION

The candidate is presented by the priest and their sponsor

John Patrick Foley has already been baptised and has formerly been a communicant member of the Roman Catholic Church. He now asks to be received into communicant membership of the Anglican Church of Australia and seek our prayers in the fellowship of this parish.

The bishop says to the candidate

Do you stand by the Christian confession and commitment made at your baptism?

I do.

Do you desire to be admitted into communicant membership of the Anglican Church of Australia and accept her doctrine and order? **I do.** 

Taking him by the hand the bishop welcomes John with these words

We recognise you as a baptised and communicant member of the Christian Church. We receive and welcome you into the communion of the Anglican Church.

The bishop says

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Let us pray. God of wisdom and love, source of all good, by your Holy Spirit strengthen your servant John Patrick Foley and guide him in your way of peace and love. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.** 

John kneels and the bishop lays hands on his head saying

John may the Holy Spirit direct and uphold you in the service of Christ and his kingdom in the fellowship of his Church. God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit bless, preserve and keep you. **Amen.**

# **MUSIC COMMENTARY**

PRELUDE: No. 3 from Vesper Voluntaries, Op 14. - Edward Elgar (1857-1934)

The *Vesper Voluntaries* set consists of eight numbered pieces with an Introduction and Coda to begin and end, plus an Intermezzo between Nos. 4 and 5. Whilst they can be played separately, Elgar evidently had it in mind that they could also be played as a group, as it appears that he planned a coherent sequence of keys. The pieces are written on two staves, and whilst pedals are indicated they are understood to be optional.

### **ART COMMENTARY**

The art on today's pewsheet is by French artist, *Jacques Dumont, also known at 'Le Romain'*. Dumont was often called 'le Romain' because of his youthful residence at Rome and to distinguish him from other artists named Dumont, notably his fellow-academician Jean-Joseph Dumont. His father, Pierre, was a court sculptor to the Duke of Lorraine and his elder brother, François, was also a sculptor.

Dumont specialized in religious painting. This particular painting was commissioned by the local church to commemorate the confirmation of a youth group from the parish. The painting was an immediate success and became one of Dumont's most famous works.

Dumont's artistic style is clearly visible in the painting, with his use of the *chiaroscuro* technique to create a dramatic and realistic effect. The composition is impressive, with the group of young people preparing to receive the sacrament of confirmation in the center of the painting, surrounded by the bishops and priests who guide them on their spiritual journey. The use of color is also notable in the painting, with a palette of warm, rich tones creating an atmosphere of solemnity and spirituality. The light coming through the window behind the youth creates a heavenly lighting effect that highlights the importance of the sacrament they are about to receive.
